Week 4	To demonstrate control over the marks made with chalk pastels.
	To explore different drawing and blending techniques using chalk
	pastels.
	To know how to care for art materials – chalk pastels.
Week 5	Learn how to use the whole space effectively when completing
	pieces of artwork.
Week 6	To use techniques taught to complete a picture of a vase of
	sunflowers using a range of mediums.

Knowledge Intentions

	Week 1	 Van Gogh was a Dutch painter, famous for his oil paintings. Famous pieces of art include "Sunflowers", "Irises" and "Almond Blossom".
	Week 2	 To understand the effects created using a HB, 2B and 4B pencil. Hatching is a method of creating shade. The lines go in one direction.
	Week 3	 To understand the term "texture". Observational drawing is what we see, not what we think we should see.
	Week 4	 To understand the term "blending" To understand the term "layering". The care needed when using chalk pastels when creating a piece of art.
	Week 5	 Begin to understand the terms positive space and negative space. To know what "landscape" and portrait" refer to when orientating paper.




Learning Intentions

Week 1	Who is LS Lowry?
	To identify and describe the style of art created by Lowry.
Week 2	What do I notice in a picture?
	Explain how a piece of art might make you feel.
	 What might you see, hear and smell if you walked into the place in the painting?
	Begin to understand how colour can change the mood of a painting.
Week 3	Practise simple sketched lines and free-hand circles and ovals.
	Experiment drawing with a variety of media.
	Draw figures in motion based on Lowry's work.
Week 4	Identify and collect existing photographs/drawings/paintings of Calne
	town and add/draw features associated with the work of Lowry.
Week 5	Create a cityscape or urban landscape of buildings using simple shapes.
	Create a background for a final piece of art.
Week 6	Begin to understand "foreground".
	Complete a "Lowry style" landscape picture.

Knowledge Intentions

Week 1	 Lowry was a British oil painter. The common features of Lowry's paintings were flat, rectangular buildings; factories with tall, smoking chimneys; and "matchstick men", or tiny, stick-thin men, women and children that crowded his cityscapes and landscapes.
Week 2	Colours and subjects can convey different moods and emotions.
	To identify warm and cool colours.
Week 3	 Sketching is a quick way to represent a demonstrating an image or idea. Sketched circles and lines can be transformed to simple figures.
Week 4	Understand term "background" when creating a piece of art.
Week 5	 Know the landscape position of a piece of paper. Cityscape refers to a picture of a city. Understand term "background" when creating a piece of art.
Week 6	 "Foreground" refers to the part of the picture nearest the viewer.



Assessment

Can the child create a simple cityscape with figures in the foreground, inspired by the work of Lowry?
